

"An Introduction to Cumbrian Railways" by David Joy



The CRA is proud to announce the publication of its latest book "An Introduction to Cumbrian Railways". Written by well-known railway historian and writer David Joy, this 96 page fully illustrated book, tells the fascinating story of the development of railways in what is now the county of Cumbria. The content spans from the earliest days in the 1830's to the present – from railway pioneers to rail privatisation.

Each railway line in the County is covered, from the main trunk lines, such as the West Coast Main Line, to the

smaller railways that went to make up the network of lines serving local communities and businesses. The Industrial lines that served the County also receive comprehensive coverage.

Basic information on the building of the railways and their subsequent development is also included. The book is topped off with a detailed bibliography for those that want to learn more

This book includes over 150 colour/monochrome photographs and more than 20 specially created colour maps.

"An Introduction to Cumbrian Railways is a book that will appeal to knowledgeable enthusiasts and newcomers alike. It is a book that one will want to pick up and read from cover to cover or dip into time and time again to browse the pictures, maps and text." says CRA Chairman Philip Tuer



Helping to Promote Carlisle's Railway Heritage

Last year the CRA were delighted to be invited to join a group discussing ways of making even more of Carlisle's long and rich railway heritage. Led by Tullie House, Chairman of Trustees, Roger Cooke, the group includes Carlisle City Council officers, broadcaster Eric Robson, author and bookseller Stephen Matthews and representatives of local railway history organisations. CRA Chairman Philip Tuer and Publicity Officer Don Jary are representing the CRA.

The Group has been looking at the current ways in which the history of railways in Carlisle are preserved and presented to both the local community and visitors alike and how this can be enhanced and extended. This doesn't just include the physical aspects of trains, railway stations and infrastructure, but also the way in which the coming of the railways shaped and changed the lives of people within and around Carlisle for several generations – and their stories.

A key focus for the Group has been to explore ways in which community projects based upon the railway heritage theme can be identified and possibly brought together to form the foundations for attracting resources to "make them happen"

To this end a public consultation meeting was held in Tullie House on Saturday 8th July. The presentation and discussions were led by Eric Robson and Roger Cooke and other members of the Group. Phillip and Don took part in both the presentation and a lively discussion session that followed. Over 50 people attended the event, including the Leader of Carlisle City Council, former Carlisle MP Eric Martlew and Professor Robin Smith. Some other CRA members were also in evidence!

Whilst this is early days, the CRA is pleased to be involved in such a worthwhile project at such an early stage. It is also further evidence of the success the Association is having in getting its skills and resources recognised. Watch this space!

Rail Locomotive travels behind Road Locomotive

Following the very successful DRS open day at Kingmoor, one of the exhibits was moved to its new home by road. Whillan Beck, the 'new' steam locomotive purchased



for operation on the R&ER was hauled to Ravenglass by Road Locomotive 'Providence'. A Sentinel tractor followed as support vehicle, carrying supplies of coal and water. The cavalcade overnighted at the Old Fire Station in Workington, as guests of the Workington Transport Heritage Trust, before completing the journey, echoing the delivery of River Mite from York to Ravenglass 50 years ago. As then, Providence required some urgent overnight maintenance. The repairs were successful, and the trip to Ravenglass was completed in fine style, even meeting up with Anne, an Agricultural engine formerly owned by Sid Sutton of Beckermert.
